Almost 1/3 of our injured riders last year were relegated to using a wheelchair for the rest of their life and 1/10 were amputees.

In the first instalment, Visitations Director Gary Richardson outlined the various difficulties he had using a manual wheelchair. He met with Paul Cuane, founder of CIVIL RIGHTS NOW!, and

they travelled together from Burnaby to the Davidson Pitt Stop Restaurant on the Fraser Highway in Surrey for lunch. They used both the Skytrain and bus systems. We pick up the story near the end of the first leg of their journey. (The quotes are from Joe South's song "Walk A Mile In My Shoes".)

#### The Trip (continued):

We got off at the 162<sup>nd</sup> Street bus stop on Fraser Highway which is about one block from the Davidson Pitt Stop Restaurant. We crossed the Fraser Highway and I was almost hit by a truck. Because of the low height of the wheelchair I felt I was invisible to drivers; Paul had warned me about this. Motorcyclists know it is important to make eye contact with oncoming drivers before turning left in an intersection and this was even more important for me due to my low visibility in the wheelchair. As before, my arms became tired and sore before I had gone the one block to the restaurant.

And yet we spend the day throwing stones at one another 'Cause I don't think or wear my hair the same way you do Well I may be common people but I'm your brother And when you strike out and try to hurt me it's a-hurtin' you.

#### Finally We Eat

After an awesome meal we headed back home. The return trip on the bus was uneventful and the Skytrain presented the usual challenge. Once again I had to rely on the good graces of a stranger to help me onto the Skytrain. As we neared Paul's place I had to hold the wheelchair back on the downhill slope. This was hard on my hands and they were very sore. When we arrived at Paul's place I still had to go down to the end of the block and wheel back up on the street (dangerous) to my pickup to put the chair in the back and again I felt insecure because I might not be seen by drivers. All of this was tiring and I felt exhausted. When I finally stood up out of the wheelchair I felt like a free man.

#### The Trip

Our trip took 1-3/4 hours each way and totaled five hours including the lunch – an excursion that would have taken less than two hours by car. Clearly, everything takes a lot longer when using a wheelchair and requires planning, foresight and patience.

and was looking down on me. Although it was not unnerving, it was demeaning. I felt helpless and at the mercy of others.

My back was sore from the prolonged sitting and my hands were sore and dirty from pushing the wheels. Wheeling the chair was demanding and tiring. Doors, curbs and inclines were especially problematic. The chair would "wheelie" or tip back every time I moved forward. The slightest uphill slope in the sidewalk made for hard work in the chair whereas I wouldn't notice it when walking. Coming down a slight slope was worse than going up as I had to hold the chair back to keep it from running away on me. The only way I could do that was to hang onto the grab-rails on the wheels and I started to burn the palms of my hands. Opening doors was also difficult and I learned to look for the automatic opening button.

While it was fun for the first few minutes, using the wheelchair fast became tedious and challenging. To me it was both a blessing and a curse, allowing me some mobility while at the same time I was continually restricted by obstacles and barriers, thus limiting my mobility.

#### Shoe Size





# Tassels – A Growing In Crowd Movement

Fads come and fads go but a recent movement promises to stay with us forever. Rigid frames, kickstarts and Earle's front ends are now passe. In an all out effort to out "oldschool" each other,

bikers have borrowed from their youth to bring into vogue the latest rage: colored "streamers" or tassels for their handgrips. Especially popular with the Starbucks crowd, these can be seen on the bikes lined up in front of the restaurant every Sunday morning before a ride begins. These tassels are usually 1/4 inch wide strips of brightly colored plastic, roughly 12 inches long, hanging off the end of both hand grips.

You remember when you were a kid you had these tacked onto the ends of your bicycle handlebars and they flew, their shifting colors resplendent in the wind, when you rode your bicycle fast. This has now been adapted to motorcycles and the movement is growing fast. But, if you want to be in with the biker "in crowd", you have to follow the rules. There is nothing worse than using the wrong colored tassels. You will be "outed" immediately as a poser and shunned by any and all true old school bikers. The following guidelines will help you be accepted by the in crowd.

The first rule is that the colors should match the color of your bike. You can either go for colors which are complementary to the colors of your bike indicating you are a harmonious cooperative type, or you can go for contrasting colors making a statement that you are hard to get along with.

For an ecological statement you can use earth tones which includes browns and greens. If you have a wild multi-colored paint job such as those you often see on sport bikes, then anything goes because everything will clash and/or complement the bike. The ultimate statement is made by black leather tassels on a bike painted all flat black preferably a rigid shovel for that mean look.

An added effect would be tassels on your black leather jacket as well. Note that the tassels on your jacket should also be black leather – colored plastic ones would not go well with the black leather and this would give a mixed message to the other bikers, potentially confusing them.

Attaching these tassels to the handgrip is extremely complicated and should not be attempted at home. This should be done by a professional at a certified motorcycle shop or dealership.

### What is the main ingredient of WD-40?

Before you read to the end, does anybody know what the main ingredient of WD-40 is? Don't lie and don't cheat. WD-40. Who knew?

I had a neighbor who bought a new pickup. I got up very early one Sunday morning and saw that someone had spray painted red all around the sides of this beige truck (for some unknown reason). I went over, woke him up, and told him the bad news. He was very upset and was trying to figure out what to do.... Probably nothing until Monday morning, since nothing was open.

Another neighbor came out and told him to get his WD-40 and clean it off. It removed the unwanted paint beautifully and did not harm his paint job that was on the truck. I'm impressed! WD-40 - who knew?

Water Displacement #40'. The product began from a search for a rust preventative solvent and de greaser to protect missile parts. Then try it on your stove top .... Viola! It's now shinier than it's ever been. You'll be amazed.

WD-40 uses:

- 1. Protects silver from tarnishing.
- 2. Removes road tar and grime from cars.
- 3. Cleans and lubricates guitar strings.
- 4. Gives floors that 'just-waxed' sheen without making them slippery.
- 5.. Keeps flies off cows.
- 6. Restores and cleans chalkboards.
- 7. Removes lipstick stains.
- 8. Loosens stubborn zippers.
- 9. Untangles jewelry chains.
- 10. Removes stains from stainless steel sinks.
- 11. Removes dirt and grime from the barbecue grill.
- 12. Keeps ceramic/terra cotta garden pots from oxidizing.
- 13. Removes tomato stains from clothing.
- 14. Keeps glass shower doors free of water spots.
- 15. Camouflages scratches in ceramic and marble floors.
- 16. Keeps scissors working smoothly.
- 17. Lubricates noisy door hinges on vehicles and doors in homes.

18. It removes black scuff marks from the kitchen floor! Use WD-40 for those nasty tar and scuff marks on flooring. It doesn't seem to harm the finish and you won't have to scrub nearly as hard to get them off. Just remember to open some windows if you have a lot of marks.

19. Bug guts will eat away the finish on your car if not removed quickly! Use WD-40!

20. Gives a children's playground gym slide a shine for a super fast slide.

21. Lubricates gear shift and mower deck lever for ease of handling on riding mowers...

22. Rids kids rocking chairs and swings of squeaky noises..

 Lubricates tracks in sticking home windows and makes them easier to open..

26. Restores and cleans roof racks on vehicles.

27. Lubricates and stops squeaks in electric fans

28. Lubricates wheel sprockets on tricycles, wagons, and bicycles for easy handling.

29. Lubricates fan belts on washers and dryers and keeps them running smoothly.

30. Keeps rust from forming on saws and saw blades, and other tools.

- 31. Removes splattered grease on stove.
- 32. Keeps bathroom mirror from fogging.
- 33. Lubricates prosthetic limbs.
- 34. Keeps pigeons off the balcony (they hate the smell).
- 35. Removes all traces of duct tape.

36. Folks even spray it on their arms, hands, and knees to relieve arthritis pain.

37. Florida 's favorite use is: 'cleans and removes love bugs from grills and bumpers.'


