Distracted Driving Kills

Motorcyclists are vulnerable on the road due to the lack of a physical shell around the rider. This makes motor cycling riding risky and statistically you are more likely to be injured while riding a motor cycle than while riding in a car.

In BC distracted driving is becoming one of the most significant causes of injuries and deaths on our roads and for motorcyclists it means that distracted driving is becoming one of the most significant risk factors you face while on the road. ICBC reports that distracted driving is responsible for an average of 78 deaths on our roads each year.

Distracted driving is response for more than one quarter of all car crash fatalities in BC. The most common type of distracted driving is the use of a cell phone to either talk, text or do some other activity, while you are driving. Studies by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety found that you are five times more likely to crash if you are on your phone. If you are looking at your phone, you can't see the road.

Not only is distracted driving risky behavior, it is also illegal. The *Motor Vehicle Act* prohibits the use of an electronic device while driving or operating a motor vehicle on a highway. Police in BC have increased enforcement of distracted driving laws and as of June 1, 2016 the fines and penalties for distracted driving have significantly increased.

Distracted Driving Kills (www.distracteddrivingkills.ca) is an initiate to create awareness about the dangers of distracted driving on BC Roads.

Eliminating this danger will only happen with all of us working together to ensure that everyone understands that distracted driving is not OK and not something that will be supported or tolerated. Help keep all of us safe on our roads by making sure that you and your loved ones are not driving distracted.

We held our SPRING DANCE in March, our third, and did well there. It was great seeing all the friendly faces and everyone seemed to have a good time.







We need them now more than ever.





THE WESTERN FRONT

Riders in BC are fortunate to have the Association for Injured Motorcyclists (AIM) on their side

Hor most of us, January is a time when we reflect on the adventures of the last 365 days and start to make plans for the New Year and the riding season that awaits us. However, for motorcyclists who have had the misfortune of being involved in an accident during 2016, the transition from one year to the next may not be as simple. While most of us can simply close the door on last year and move on to the new one, the same can't be said for individuals and their families dealing with physical, financial and legal issues from motorcycle accidents.

In 1983, having experienced first-hand the difficulties that accompany a motorcycle accident, four riders in British Columbia came up with an idea that would ultimately become the Association for Injured Motorcyclists (AIM).

From the original founding members—Ed Bell, Al Walker, Ray Leadbetter and Skip Stuart— AIM has grown to over 1,000 members dedicated to providing assistance to any one of BC's more than 220,000 motorcyclists in times of need.

Exactly what does AIM do to help riders who have been injured in a motorcycle accident? In order to obtain some insight into this question, I recently spent some time with the association's president, Dave Munro.

As Dave explains, one of the principal goals of the association is to make sure that an injured rider receives the information they need to make decisions and be aware of their rights within the legal, healthcare and insurance systems as they deal with the aftermath of an accident. This is typically done through in-person hospital visits. "Most of the time we work to answer questions that they have of what is going to transpire as things move forward," says Munro. "Unfortunately people are often classified as a number and they don't always receive the information that is going to help them, so we go in to see what they need." Undertaking this type of initiative requires a substantial knowledge base, and AIM is fortunate to have a number of lawyers included in their membership as well as relationships with education and rehabilitation agencies.

In developing its program, AIM made sure to address the r eality that the long-term impact of an accident can extend beyond the injured party. "If a person is hurt pretty bad with permanent injuries, we try to work with the family and help them work through what they can expect and what kind of adjustments they are going to need to make, and inform them about programs that are available to help them," adds Munro. "There are a lot of programs that the government has that people don't know about that are there to help people in these types of situations."

In addition to providing information and access to resources,

AIM also provides other forms of assistance to Injured riders, such as offering to transport the damaged motorcycle and, in certain circumstances, providing short-term financial assistance.

Of course, the best way to address accidents is to prevent them in the first place, and AIM dedicates a great deal of time and energy to promoting public awareness at events throughout British Columbia, as well as publishing quarterly newsletters. Helping riders work through the aftermath of being injured on a motorcycle provides AIM with insight into emerging trends of what is causing the accidents. "We do see more accidents lately, especially in the last few years, of bikes hitting bikes," Munro cites as an example. "If a person is not paying attention when they are riding staggered, it is easier to hit the person in front of them."

AIM believes that providing this type of information to riders is critical to ensuring that roadways remain safe for motorcyclists. In addition to awareness campaigns targeting riders, Munro also highlights the efforts directed at ensuring that lawmakers and Insurance providers are proactively informed of the issues facing riders in the province. "We have held one-on-one meetings with the Solicitor General's office as well as the head officials of ICBC (the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia)," he notes.

Making the work of this group even more impressive is the fact that it is a registered non-profit organization, 100 percent operated by volunteers and funded solely by donations and advertising revenues generated by its newsletters.

AIM would welcome the opportunity to expand beyond British Columbia, but Munro is also realistic that this is dependent on volunteers coming forward to open and operate new chapters. The reality is that, despite all of our planning and preparation, we can't predict what is around the next corner. And while you will hopefully never need the services of AIM, it is comforting to know that someone is looking out for you. 2016 Visitation Report

"We understand that riding motorcycles is not about safety, it's about managing risk." - Sergeant Mark Pope, California Highway Patrol

Another year has closed and from a downed rider perspective it has been busy. By the end of the year we will have done roughly 150 Visitations, helped over 40 riders and a dozen family members. As of this writing (November 6, 2016) we are still visiting six downed riders either in hospital, at GF Strong Rehab Centre, or at home.

Surprisingly, we had five riders with amputations, four of them being their leg. In fact, the majority of our downed riders sustained injury most commonly to their legs. The legs seem to get the worst of it; perhaps the weight of the motorcycle traps them.

Statistically, we have had a large number of Single Vehicle Accidents (SVA), some due to road conditions but difficult to prove without witnesses.

We also had a high proportion of left-hand turning cars colliding with oncoming motorcycles. These are avoidable and are inexcusable as the driver of the car is not looking before they pull out in the path of the motorcyclist.

And the excuse "I didn't see him/her" doesn't cut it as all motorcycles are wired so that the headlight is on all times when the ignition switch is on. They just didn't bother looking. In most of the cases, the police had advised the motorcyclist that it was the car driver's fault.

Not an eye-opener for us though as we are used to that.

Another surprise this year was the large number of downed riders who live in the upper Fraser Valley. Fortunately, we have Visitation Volunteers who live there and they were able to visit those riders.

We helped various downed riders who were in a tight spot financially while in hospital and upon discharge. Many downed riders have no wage loss coverage where they work and need help. This, of course, is our mandate. We also look to see if anyone needs a little help over the Christmas season, as we usually do.

Recognition and appreciation goes to our Visitation Volunteers who gladly visited and cheered up our downed riders. Last November we held a training course and certified a number of Visitation Volunteers and they all worked diligently this year. Each one brings different skills "to the table" and made our Visitations program a success. And this year we had enough Visitation Volunteers to cover all the downed riders.

But, we can always use more. The work is rewarding and it is nice to work with others with the same goals and agenda. As Winston Churchill so aptly said: "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give."
